Tips To Prepare You Home for Winter

And save a little money too...



A few simple precautions prior to the arrival of our brutally cold weather can save you from a very costly and inconvenient disaster.

Living in a climate where the temperature can be plus 10 degrees one day, and minus 25 the next, makes it even more important to ensure that our homes are winter ready.

Here are a few things you can do to reduce the risk of a disastrous event:

- 1. Have your fireplaces and chimneys professionally cleaned to remove creosote build up and dead animals.
- 2. Check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors monthly and replace the batteries as necessary.
- 3. Turn off exterior water supply and drain water from outdoor pipes, and valves to prevent pipes from bursting.
- 4. Seal the gaps and cracks around your windows and doors to keep your home warm and using less energy.
- 5. Check your garage heaters to make sure they are in proper working order.
- 6. Inspect and replace weather stripping around doors to keep the cold out and reduce heating bills.
- 7. Replace furnace filters and have it inspected to ensure proper operation. Atco Gas will provide the service free of charge.
- 8. Inspect and clean dryer vents as lint built up in the duct behind the machine not only reduces the efficiency of your dryer but can also cause fires.
- 9. Test and inspect smoke detectors and carbon monoxide monitors to ensure proper operation.
- 10. Purchase a fire extinguisher for the kitchen.



SNOW REMOVAL

Landscapers by Nature provide snow removal and roadway maintenance in the Complex during winter. The icy conditions on the roadway are a constant challenge, and while there's no simple solution The Board is continually exploring ways to mitigate this hazard.

A few things to keep in mind this season:

- Snow is cleared from driveways, doorsteps and the common roadway when we get a certain volume of snowfall
- Snow should be cleared within a 24-hour time frame, but response time can vary depending on the amount we receive
- Between snow removal days, please use a broom or plastic shovel to clear snow from your doorstep as metal shovels will chip and peel the paint.
- Backyard snow removal from concrete pads and decks is the responsibility of the owner.
- For increased traction around doorsteps and drive-ways, and to lessen the risk of slips and falls, there are gravel bins (filled with salted gravel) located by the south-east and north-west garbage enclosures in the complex. Bring a small container with you to transport the gravel.

It's a good idea to have some gravel on hand before you need it.

• You can also purchase de-icer for use on doorsteps and driveways. Make sure to purchase an environmentally friendly product that contains calcium magnesium acetate, aka CMA. Using sodium chloride, aka straight salt, will degrade the asphalt and act as an irritant to pets.

SPEED LIMIT

The posted speed limit on the sign at the front entrance for the complex is 15km/hr. Adhering to the speed limit is especially important in the winter as conditions maybe slippery and you don't know what's around our curves.

SURVAILENCE EQUIPEMENT/CAMERAS

Please note GTC does not allow outdoor cameras at this time due to privacy reasons and we ask that you respect your neighbors by not installing them. Doorbell cameras however both front and rear entrance are permitted.

PARKING

Since our roadway is also a fire lane, there is no parking allowed on the roadway. All vehicles, including visitors, must be parked in your driveway or either on Glamis Drive



or 50th Street. The City of Calgary Parking authority patrols our complex and vehicles illegally parked will be ticketed and or towed.

Please note that our bylaws also state that a unit with a single car garage may have

only 1 car parked on the front pad and a double garage may only have 2.

DOGS & CLEANUP Please make sure your dogs are on a hand leash at any time you are walking around the Complex and please do not let them urinate on your neighbors' lawn. Please clean up any dog waste immediately and place into the garbage receptacle. Our composting bins are not designed to handle dog waste.

NOISY NEIGHBOUR??

Please be respectful of the noise level during your holiday merriment! If you need to report noise levels, please **call bylaw services at 311** directly.






Our 4-Legged Residents

Yours, Mine, Or Ours

As owners in a condominium complex the question sometimes arises whether it's mine or it's the complex. These questions are answered by the corporation By-laws. The By-laws are a group of rules decided by the Owners in the complex to ensure maintenance, peacefulness, uniformity and common aesthetics.

What do you own and are responsible for generally?

You are responsible for everything in the interior of your home. This includes painting, heating, hot water and other utilities. Water supply and garbage removal is taken care of by the Corporation



What are you responsible for specifically?

- Window hardware, cranks, hinges, and latches
- Garage door hardware including opener and tracks
- Mailboxes and doorbell buttons
- House numbering
- Window screens and screens or storm doors
- Door hardware, hinges, knobs, and locks and viewers
- Interior decorating, drywall, stipple, and interior doors

- Floor coverings
- Non load bearing partitions
- Communications systems
- Heating and electrical appliances
- All insulation in the unit
- Plumbing within the unit
- Exterior light fixtures

Although many items are owners' responsibility, it is important to maintain uniformity throughout the Complex. It is therefore a requirement that if any exterior items are to be replaced the Board must be notified in order to maintain uniformity.

Yards, driveways, patios and decks are common property of the corporation but are designated for the sole use of the residents. Some issues may arise that are unclear as to who has responsibility. For further information please contact our management company, FirstService Residential.

Kid's Korner

TISSUE WREATH

You will need:

- Circular wreath form cut from recycled cereal box or a paper plate
- Lots and LOTS of green tissue paper squares
- White glue
- Paint brush
- Pencil with eraser
- Embellissements pom poms, sequins, etc. (optional)
- Ribbon or string for hanging





Use the paintbrush to spread a small amount of white glue on to a section of the wreath (work on about 1/6 of the wreath at a time). Use the eraser end of the pencil to shape each square of tissue paper as shown.



Use the eraser to help you place your tissue paper squares on to the wreath form and continue to work section by section until the entire wreath form is full and covered.

Add optional embellishments – pom poms make great holly berries, sequins and glitter add sparkle, and large buttons make nice "ornaments.



Add a ribbon for hanging, and the wreath is ready to be displayed or gifted!

Turtle Stuffed Shortbread Cookies – Julie Van Rosendaal



Ingredients

1 cup butter

½ cup icing sugar

1 tsp Vanilla

2 cups all-purpose flour

2 TBSP Cornstarch

¼ tsp fine salt

1 box of Turtles

Icing sugar for dusting (optional)

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F
- 2. In a large bowl beat together the butter, icing sugar, and vanilla until smooth, then stir in the flour, cornstarch, and salt until it comes together in a soft dough.
- 3. Take a walnut size piece of dough and wrap it around a turtle to enclose it completely. Roll it in your hand to make it roundish and smooth then place it on a parchment lined baking sheet. If your hands are warm or it is warm in the room, you may need to chill the dough in the fridge for 30 mins. or so to help them keep their shape.
- 4. Bake the yummy cookies for approximately 18-20 minutes or until pale golden on the bottom and around the edges. Cool on the sheet or cookie rack then if desired sprinkle with icing sugar before serving.

Makes about 1 dozen cookies

Creamy Vegan Coconut Ginger Carrot Soup



Ingredients

- 2 tsp olive oil or water
- 1 medium white onion, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tbsp fresh ginger, minced
- 1 tsp cumin
- 1 tsp coriander
- 5 cup peeled and chopped carrots (approx. 7 large carrots)
- 3 cups vegetable stock
- 1 cup canned full fat coconut milk
- salt and pepper, as needed

Method:

- 1. Sauté Onion and Garlic: If you're using oil, heat it in a large soup pot over medium heat then add the onion and garlic with a pinch of salt and pepper and cook for 3-4 minutes until fragrant and soft. For oil-free soup, use water or broth instead of oil.
- 2. Add Ginger, Carrot and Spices: Add the ginger, carrot and spices, along with another pinch of salt and pepper, and cook for another minute, stirring constantly. If the pan starts to dry out, you can add a splash of water or broth.
- 3. **Simmer Soup**: Add the coconut milk and vegetable broth and let it simmer lightly, uncovered for about 20 minutes or until the carrots are fork tender and cooked through. Remove the soup from heat.
- 4. **Blend Soup**: Use an immersion blender in the pot or carefully transfer the soup to a blender and blend until smooth and creamy. Pour it back into the pot.
- 5. **Season and Serve:** Taste the soup and adjust the seasoning if needed. Serve right away with finely chopped cilantro, a drizzle of coconut milk and a squeeze of fresh lime juice.

This year they even have the option of hosting a virtual food drive! https://www.calgaryfoodbank.com/yourevent/


